#### **\*\*Economic Reimbursement of Expenditures (Public Assistance):**

DHS&EM has initialized contact efforts and processed requests for Public Assistance to jurisdictions, government and nongovernmental agencies. 213 agencies requiring contact; 146 contacted of 211 attempted. Requests for Public Assistance (RPA); 68 RPA's submitted to FEMA data management system of 82 anticipated.

	 <p>Government Services</p>	<p><b>Schools:</b> The State of Alaska (SOA) <u>Health Mandate 013</u> suspended K-12 public and private schools for the remainder of the 2019-2020 school year. Distance learning will continue in accordance with each school district’s plan.</p>
	 <p>Community Safety</p>	<p><b>Phase 1 of Reopening Alaska:</b> <u>Health Mandate 016</u> includes updates to multiple existing mandates as part of a phased reopening of the state economy. These include changes to childcare &amp; day camps, fishing charters, gym/fitness centers, lodging &amp; overnight camping, and intrastate travel provisions contained in mandates 3.1, 11, and 12.</p> <p><u>Health Mandate 017</u> established protective measures for defined independent commercial fishing vessels in lieu of submitting a Community/Workforce Protective Plan under mandate 10 or 12.</p> <p><b>Social Distancing and Enforced Closure of Public Spaces:</b> <u>Health Mandate 011</u> ordered the closure of non-governmental and non-essential businesses at 5pm on March 28<sup>th</sup>. The mandate also prohibited gatherings with non-family members regardless of number. The mandate remains in effect with the following changes.</p> <p><i>Mandate 16 has permitted the reopening of non-essential businesses, including personal care services under Mandate 9.1, and dine-in service under Mandate 3.1, that can comply with requirements set out within Mandate 16. Those unable to comply must remain closed.</i></p> <p><i>Mandate 16 also permits outdoor recreational gatherings of up to 20 people with restrictions.</i></p>

		<p>DCCED e-mail address to be used to report suspected violations of the health mandates, including quarantine: <a href="mailto:investigations@alaska.gov">investigations@alaska.gov</a>.</p> <p><b>International &amp; Interstate Travel:</b>  <u>SOA Health Mandate 010</u> orders a mandatory 14-day self-quarantine for both international &amp; interstate travelers (resident or non-resident) traveling to Alaska; failure to follow this order is punishable by the law.</p> <p>The US-Canada border remains closed to non-essential travel.</p> <p><b>Intrastate Travel:</b>  <u>SOA Health Mandate 012</u> suspended all in-state travel unless necessary to support identified critical infrastructure or for identified critical personal needs. This mandate remains in effect until rescinded.</p> <p><i>Mandate 16 has permitted recreational travel activities for households, with certain restrictions and protective measures required.</i></p>

	 <p>Food</p>	<p><b>Food Bank:</b>          Food banks are experiencing higher than normal traffic, compounded by a reduced volunteer staff due to the COVID health mandates. Representatives estimate six-week food supply on hand and supply chains remain intact.</p>

	 <p>Shelter</p>	<p><b>Quarantine and Isolation:</b>  <u>Health Mandate 014</u> directed non-congregate sheltering to be implemented to better protect at-risk populations.</p> <p>The State of Alaska is prepared to implement a temporary quarantine and isolation program utilizing non-congregate shelter solutions including hotels, college and university dormitories, and properly modified non-traditional structures to house three specific populations:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• First responders and healthcare workers who need to quarantine safely without exposing their families.</li> <li>• Homeless families, with at least one member who tested positive for COVID-19, who live in congregate shelters and will require isolation.</li> <li>• Homeless individuals who require quarantine or isolation.</li> </ul>

Medical Care

### **Health Care Facilities and Health Care Providers:**

Health Mandate 015, Services by Health Care Providers, will go into effect in phases, with Section II going into effect April 20, 2020 and Section IV going into effect May 4, 2020.

Sec II: Effective April 20, 2020, Health care facilities and providers defined in statute and listed in Section I, Health Mandate 15, will be able to resume services that require minimal protective equipment and follow the published guidance.

Sec IV: Effective May 4, 2020, Provision for Resuming Non-Urgent/Non-Emergent Elective Services. Health care services that cannot be delayed beyond eight weeks without posing a significant risk to quality of life may resume if the published conditions of Health Mandate 015 are met.

### **Alternate Care Sites:**

Three alternate care sites are established at the Alaska Airlines Center in Anchorage, Carlson Center in Fairbanks and AVTEC in Seward.

### **Emergency Medical Flight Services:**

Air Operations Branch is developing agreements for temporary helicopter pad use at alternate care sites to facilitate the transport of COVID-19 patients.

The Branch is also working with Forestry to develop plans for aircraft during summer wildfire season while maintaining ability to respond to COVID-19 needs.



Public Health

### **Epidemiological Surveillance:**

Efforts continue to identify new cases and prevent community spread of the disease.

### **Laboratory:**

Statewide Case Count totals: 345 positive/218 recovered/37 hospitalized/9 deaths. \*

Approx. 16,000 tests have been conducted within the state.

\* includes 1 Alaska resident located in WA state.



Medical Supply Chain

**Blood Bank:**

Blood Bank of Alaska is requesting recovered COVID-19 patients donate plasma; blood type O+/O- is the current "critical need".

**Distribution:**

Efforts continue to source sufficient personal protective equipment and materials such as ventilators for hospitals statewide. Alaska has received multiple shipments from the DHHS Strategic National Stockpile to date.

- Delta Junction – Water on roads with isolated road closures

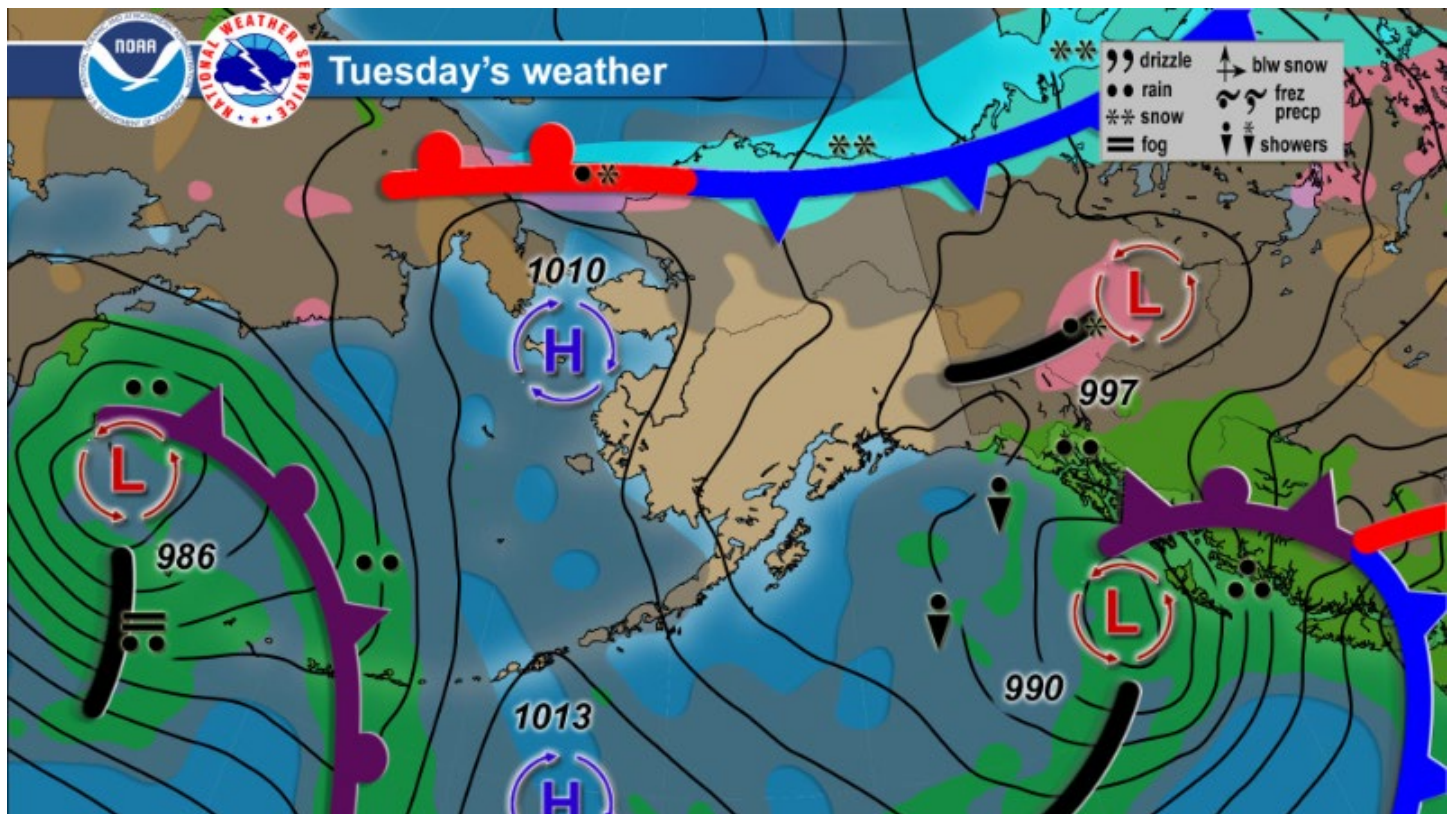
- Elliot Hwy – Difficult traveling, road surface in poor condition, west of Livengood
