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## State Emergency Operations Center (SEOC) Activated to Level 3

### Incident Overview

#### Timeline of Significant Events

- 11 MAR 20 – Gov Dunleavy declares a Public Health Disaster Emergency.
- 14 MAR 20 – Gov Dunleavy Announces first confirmed case in Alaska.
- 20 MAR 20 – Gov Dunleavy Announces Alaska COVID-19 Economic Stabilization Plan. DHSS announces 12<sup>th</sup> confirmed case in state.
- 25 MAR 20 – First out-of-state death of an Alaska resident reported in Washington.
- 27 MAR 20 – First in-state death of an Alaska resident reported in Anchorage.
- 28 MAR 20 – Case count in-state exceeds 100 for first time.

#### Health Mandate - School Closures:

The State of Alaska (SOA) Health Mandate 008 (3/20) dictates that all scheduled public-school days through May 1, 2020 will be non-student contact days in which students will not be attending school. Schools have begun deployment of distance learning.

#### Child Care:

DHSS is fielding questions from licensed providers. Guidance was published in the SOA Health Alert 008 (3/17). Additional guidance will be provided as necessary.

#### Protective Measures – Law Enforcement:

A number of communities have enacted additional screening requirements in addition to those outlined in the Governor's Health Mandates.

#### Health Mandates - Social Distancing and Enforced Closure of Public Spaces:

SOA Health Mandate 011 (3/28) mandates all individuals cease gatherings with non-family members regardless of number of people present. This includes weddings, church or other faith-based gatherings, and graduations.

Further the order mandates those that are ill or displaying symptoms of illness must remain home except to seek medical care as required.

The order additionally required all non-governmental and non-critical infrastructure businesses to close, effective 5:00 p.m. on March 28 until further notice. Permissible activities for businesses during the closure are limited to defined minimum basic operations. The mandate will be reevaluated on April 11.



## Food, Water, Sheltering



Food

### Food Distribution Programs

Due to school closures, school lunch programs transitioned to alternative delivery. The SEOC is unaware of any current unmet needs.

### Commercial Food Supply Chain

There are no disruptions to the commercial food supply chain at this time.



## Health and Medical



### Statewide Positive Case Count total: 119 current/7 hospitalized/3 deaths\*

There are currently 119 confirmed cases in Alaska. Community-spread of the disease is occurring in Alaska.

\* includes 1 Alaska resident located in WA state



## Transportation



### International & Interstate Travel:

SOA Health Mandate 010 (3/23) orders a mandatory 14-day self-quarantine for both international & interstate travelers (resident or non-resident) traveling to Alaska; failure to follow this order is punishable by the law.

### Intrastate Travel:

SOA Health Mandate 012 (3/28) suspends all in-state travel unless necessary to support identified critical infrastructure or for identified critical personal needs.

The mandate also empowers small communities to enact more strict travel restrictions than outlined in the mandate provided they comply with state guidance.

### US Canada Border Crossing

United States and Canada are temporarily restricting all non-essential travel across the ALCAN border. "Non-essential" travel includes travel that is considered tourism or recreational in nature.

## Weather Forecast (Statewide)

### Anchorage & Mat-Su

Northeast winds 30 to 45 mph with gusts of 55 to 75 mph expected in the Mat-Su. Weakening through Monday. Travel will be difficult, esp. for high profile vehicles.

### Gulf Coast

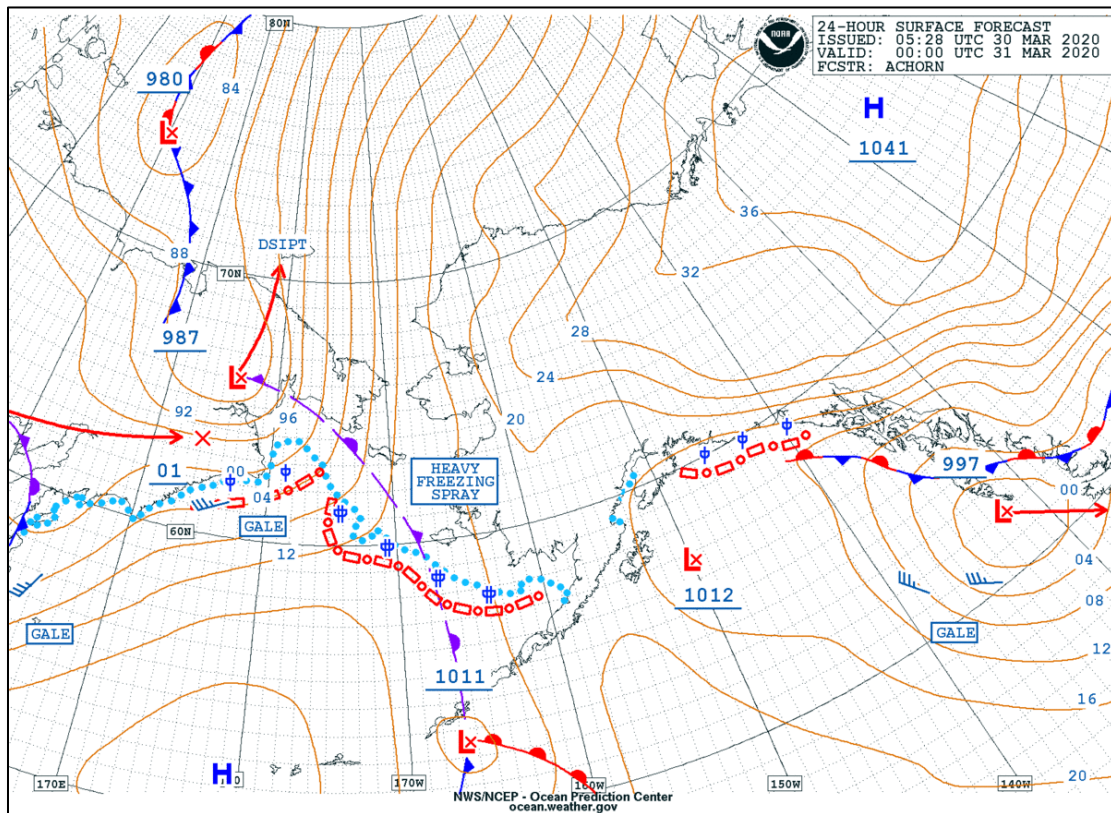
No hazards expected over the next 48 hours.

### Interior

High winds and blowing/drifted snow through Mentasta and Isabel Passes on Monday. Areas of poor visibility and slick roadways too will create difficult travel conditions at times.

### Southeast

Northeast winds 30 to 40 mph with gusts up to 65 mph expected in Juneau. Weakening Monday evening. Travel will be difficult, esp. for high profile vehicles. Moderate turbulence expected today in Juneau.
