Significant Issues:

SEOC at Level 2 - Heightened Awareness - Statewide Severe Weather Impacts

The State Emergency Operations Center (SEOC) is activated in a hybrid virtual/in-person Incident Command structure to manage the current state declared disaster responses and other incidents arising statewide from ongoing severe weather. Please see the attached incident specific situation report and press release for the ongoing disaster response and recovery to the severe weather in the Interior, Mat-Su, Copper River, Delta Junction, and Southeast Alaska.

Southeast – Disaster Declaration, Heavy Snow, Structural Collapse, Avalanche Risk

The SEOC received a local declaration of disaster from the City & Borough of Yakutat requesting state assistance for heavy snow and ice loading, potential structural collapse, and other issues related to extreme cold temperatures and excessive snowfall. Over the last several days the SEOC has received reports of additional weather concerns from various communities across Southeast who are responding to numerous school, business, government facility, and road closures due to the weather. In response, yesterday Governor Dunleavy issued a disaster declaration for the City and Borough of Yakutat, Haines Borough, Municipality of Skagway and the City and Borough of Juneau, activating the state Public Assistance program for the declared area.



Significant Weather:



A Winter Weather Advisory is in effect until 9:00 A.M. today for freezing rain in the Valdez area.

A Wind Chill Advisory remains in effect until 9:00 P.M. today for the Eastern Beaufort Sea Coast. Wind chills of up to 55° below zero are possible.

A Special Weather Statement has been issued for the Haines Borough, Lynn Canal, Taiya Inlet and the Klondike Highway. A weather system is expected to impact the area with a mix of rain and snow beginning Thursday and lasting through the weekend. Up to a foot of snow is possible along the highway, 2 to 6 inches near Haines and up to 3 inches for Skagway.

A Special Weather Statement has been issued for much of the Panhandle. A low pressure system is expected to bring moderate amounts of precipitation beginning tomorrow. Total rainfall amounts between 1.5 to 3.5 inches are possible, with some wintry mix falling overnight. This system will also likely bring gusty winds to the Hydaburg, Ketchikan and Sitka areas and the potential for nuisance flooding.
