

Special Weather Statements:

Tanana Flats; Eielson AFB and Salcha; Goldstream Valley and Nenana Hills; Two Rivers; Fairbanks Metro Area.

As of 7am Thursday, Fairbanks had 1.2 inches of snow and hillside locations north and west of town reported near 2 inches of snow. Another inch of snow is expected through noon today when the snow tapers off. Storm totals are expected to be 2 inches in town and 3 inches in the hills by noon today. Little additional snowfall is expected after noon. West winds gusting to 25 mph are causing blowing and drifting snow. These winds along with drifting snow will continue into this evening.

Yukon Flats; Upper Chena River Valley; Chatanika River Valley.

Periods of Snow and Blowing Snow Through Tonight. Snowfall and gusty winds between 20 and 30 mph will this morning and persist into tonight, resulting in localized areas of blowing snow, especially over higher terrain. Snowfall accumulations of 2 to 3 inches can be expected. Conditions are expected to improve Friday morning.

Watches:

City and Borough of Juneau

Flood watch remains in effect through this afternoon. Flooding caused by excessive rainfall continues to be possible. The following area, Central Inner Channels. This includes the city of Juneau. Excessive runoff may result in flooding of rivers, creeks, streams, other low-lying areas, and flood-prone locations. Flooding may occur in poor drainage areas. Low water crossings may be flooded. Streams throughout the Juneau area, have reached and stayed at or near bankful due to moderate to heavy rain. Precipitation is expected to continue through the morning on Thursday before rainfall rates diminish Thursday afternoon.

Warnings:

Eastern Beaufort Sea Coast.

Snowfall of 3 to 5 inches expected today ahead of the increasing winds Friday. This snow will combine with falling snow and strong winds to further reduce visibility in blow snow. Winds are expected to increase substantially from the west Friday morning. Strongest winds are expected Friday night and Saturday when winds could gust as high as 60 mph. Winds and snow will begin to decrease Saturday night.
