Explanation of how Housing and Other Needs Assistance Disbursed can exceed Housing and Other Needs Assistance Approved:

The amount of Housing and Other Needs Assistance Approved in NEMIS should equal the amount of Housing and Other Needs Assistance Paid in IFMIS as shown on the HONA FIT Report. However, the following is a list of occasions when they won't equal.

- 1. Cancelled checks reissued
  - a. In NEMIS, checks are cancelled and reissued immediately (the same day)
  - b. In IFMIS, checks are reissued immediately, but the cancellation cannot be posted in IFMIS until the DFC receives confirmation from Treasury
  - c. It could take several weeks from the time a check is cancelled in NEMIS until the DFC receives confirmation from Treasury and posts it in IFMIS
  - d. Eventually, all Treasury check cancellations will be posted in IFMIS and paid amounts will equal approved amounts
- 2. Timing difference

  - d. The HONA FIT Report is updated only once per day after the 2:30 PM sweep
  - e. Any Housing and Other Needs Assistance Approvals that occur in NEMIS after the 2:30 PM sweep will not appear on the HONA FIT Report until the next day
  - f. Therefore, the only time the Approved amounts from NEMIS will agree with the HONA FIT Report Payments from IFMIS is at 2:30 PM and only if there have been no check cancellations, posting errors, or other anomalies
- 3. Error in posting
  - a. There is a possibility that Housing and Other Needs Assistance in NEMIS may not equal what is in IFMIS due to posting errors in IFMIS
  - b. These errors would have to first be identified, then corrected in IFMIS to eliminate any differences due to posting errors
  - c. As of 09-27-2004, there were no Housing and Other Needs Assistance posting errors for NEMIS Declarations in IFMIS
