Government Services

#### Schools:

The State of Alaska (SOA) Health Mandate 013 suspended K-12 public and private schools for the remainder of the 2019-2020 school year. Distance learning will continue in accordance with each school district's plan.



Community Safety

#### Social Distancing and Enforced Closure of Public Spaces:

SOA Health Mandate 011 mandates all individuals cease gatherings with non-family members regardless of number of people present. The order additionally required all non-governmental and non-critical infrastructure businesses to close, effective 5:00 p.m. on March 28. This mandate remains in effect until April 21, 2020.

Governor Dunleavy announced the suspension of certain regulations and statutes to provide relief to individuals and businesses impacted by COVID-19.


#### International & Interstate Travel:


SOA Health Mandate 010 orders a mandatory 14-day self-quarantine for both international & interstate travelers (resident or non-resident) traveling to Alaska; failure to follow this order is punishable by the law.

Health Mandate 10, Attachment A was updated on April 10, 2020. The update revised and expanded the list of critical industry, highlighting the fishing industry.

		<p>United States and Canada are temporarily restricting all non-essential travel across the ALCAN border. “Non-essential” travel includes travel that is considered tourism or recreational in nature.</p> <p><b>Intrastate Travel:</b>  <u>SOA Health Mandate 012</u> suspends all in-state travel unless necessary to support identified critical infrastructure or for identified critical personal needs. This mandate remains in effect until April 21, 2020.</p> <p><u>Health Mandate 12, Attachment B</u> updated on April 9, 2020, listed additional classes of traveler that are exempt from small community restrictions while expanding recommendations for communities to protect their populations from COVID-19.</p>

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	 Food	<p><b>Food Bank:</b>          Food banks are experiencing higher than normal traffic, compounded by a reduced volunteer staff due to the COVID health mandates. Representatives express an estimated six-week food supply on hand and their supply chain remains intact.</p>
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	 Shelter	<p><b>Quarantine and Isolation:</b>  <u>Health Mandate 014</u> directed non-congregate sheltering to be implemented to better protect at-risk populations.</p> <p>The State of Alaska is prepared to implement a temporary quarantine and isolation program utilizing non-congregate shelter solutions including hotels, college and university dormitories, and properly modified non-traditional structures to house three specific populations:</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> <li>1. First responders and healthcare workers who need to quarantine safely without exposing their families.</li> <li>2. Homeless families, with at least one member who tested positive for COVID-19, who live in congregate shelters and will require isolation.</li> <li>3. Homeless individuals who require quarantine or isolation.</li> </ol>
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## Health and Medical



Medical Care

**Health Care Facilities and Health Care Providers:**

Health Mandate 015, Services by Health Care Providers, will go into effect in phases, with Section II going into effect April 20, 2020 and Section IV going into effect May 4, 2020.

Sec II: Effective April 20, 2020, Health care facilities and providers defined in statute and listed in Section I, Health Mandate 15, will be able to resume services that require minimal protective equipment and follow the published guidance.

Sec IV: Effective May 4, 2020, Provision for Resuming Non-Urgent/Non-Emergent Elective Services. Health care services that cannot be delayed beyond eight weeks without posing a significant risk to quality of life may resume if the published conditions of Health Mandate 015 are met.

**Alternate Care Sites:**

Two primary alternate care sites are being established at the Alaska Airlines Center in Anchorage and the Carlson Center in Fairbanks.

**Emergency Medical Flight Services:**

Air Operations Branch is developing agreements for temporary helicopter pad use at alternate care sites to facilitate the transport of COVID-19 patients.

Additionally, the Branch continues to develop patient movement and prioritization plans.



Public Health

**Epidemiological Surveillance:**

Efforts continue to identify new cases and prevent community spread of the disease.

**Laboratory:**

Statewide Case Count totals: 309 positive/36 hospitalized/128 recovered/9 deaths. \*

Approx. 8,700 tests have been conducted within the state.

\* includes 1 Alaska resident located in WA state.





Medical Supply Chain

**Blood Bank:**

Blood Bank of Alaska has reported blood shortages due to the coronavirus outbreak. They are continuing to solicit for healthy donors.

**Distribution:**

Efforts continue to source sufficient personal protective equipment and materials such as ventilators for hospitals statewide. Alaska has received multiple shipments from the DHHS Strategic National Stockpile to date.

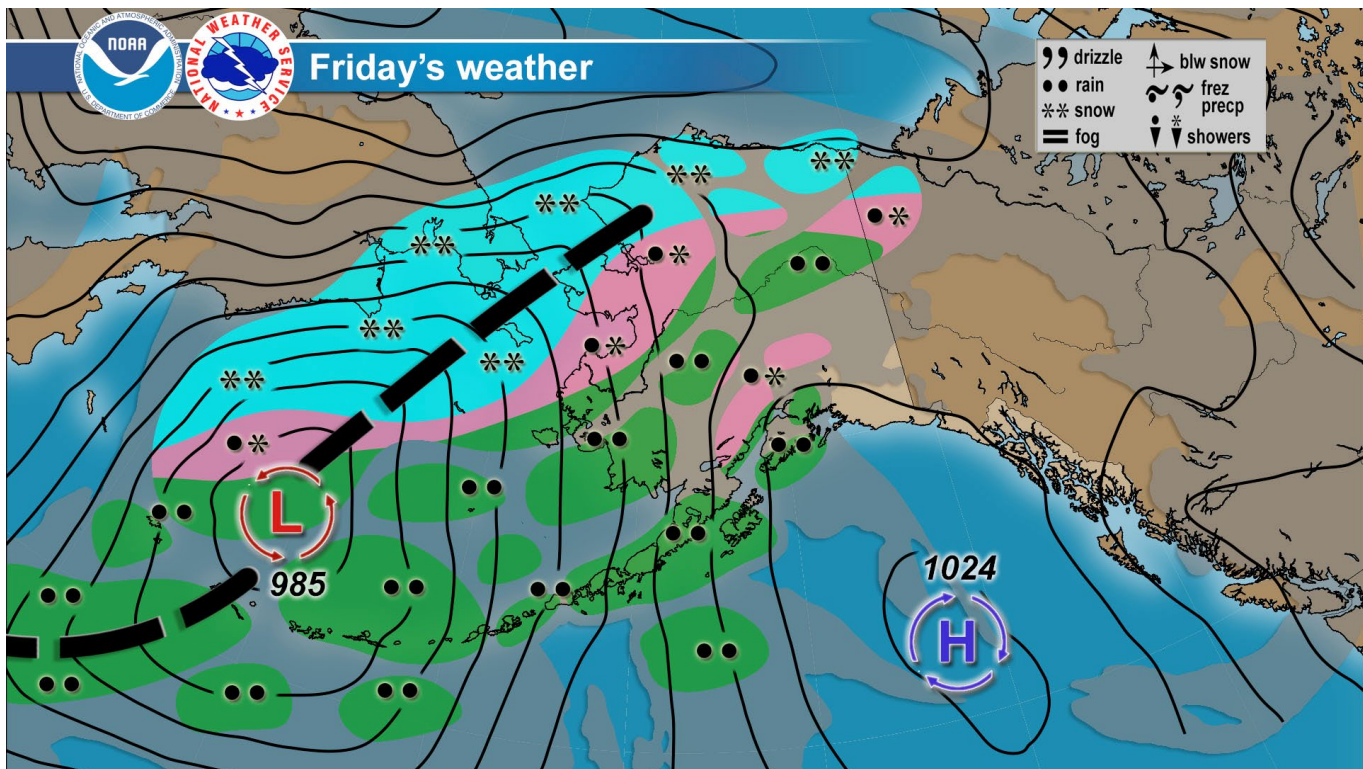
