Haines Mass Care

A robust mass care effort continues to look after approximately 101 sheltered residents in local hotels, plus possibly another 100+ residents housed within the community with neighbors, friends, etc. Mass care operations are a prime focus of the state and local response. Red Cross and The Salvation Army are providing food, water, shelter support, and other needs to evacuees.

Haines Home Damage

At least 21 homes are inaccessible, 2 homes completely destroyed by the slide and 3 with major damage. Red Cross tentatively planning to conduct damage assessments beginning 10 Dec 2020.

Haines Roads and Bridges

All state and major connector roads in the Haines area are currently open and emergency repairs have been completed. The Haines Highway is open from Haines to the Canadian border. Lutak Road is open. Beach Road and Mount Riley Road are closed in the evacuation area near the large landslide.

Interior

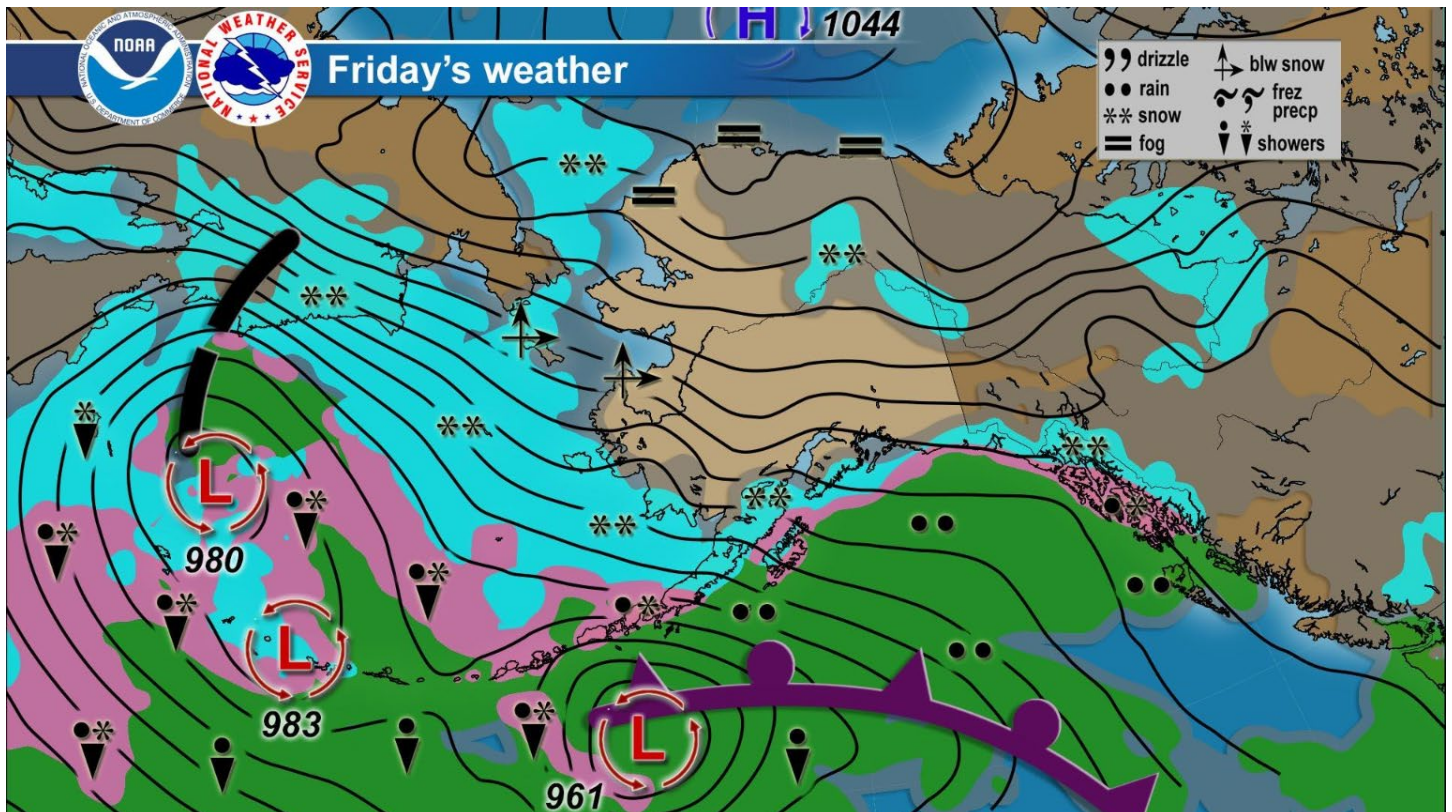
- Periods of IFR flight conditions today
