We all wish you well in your 25 retirement, uh -- can't -- can't wait to follow your -

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- your travels on -- on, uh, social media, uh -- but I did, you know -- we all, you know -- I think we all had our challenges and continue to have challenges throughout the -- with the pandemic, and, uh -- I have to tell you, I -- you know, we all were seeing the same thing at our various levels of government with -you know, surprises from our assemblies and councils and -- and, uh -- elected officials that we were having to adjust throughout the pandemic. Uh, Kathy Shay (ph) Jean: 23 asked me to just kind of speak on our, uh, CRTK fees, 24 because, uh, apparently we're the only municipality, 25 uh, that charges for hazardous materials, so this is

| 19 | | uh, enacted the the SARA Act, the Superfund |
| 20 | | Reorganization Reauth Reauthorization Act, |
| 21 | | which in turn required the municipality of Anchorage |
| 22 | | to respond by enacting Charter 16 Title 16, Chapter |
| 23 | | 110 of the Municipal Code, known as the CRTK program. |
| 24 | | The act requires all facilities within the geographic |
| 25 | | boundaries of the municipality of Anchorage to |

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evaluate the hazardous, uh, materials, chemicals, and any substances, uh, or materials used or stored on -on their site and file a Tier 2 form annual to the Anchorage Fire Department. Uh, the next slide shows, uh -- items that are covered under the municipal code, and, uh -- the municipal code outlines the reporting requirements for the municipality of Anchorage. And, uh -- the Anchorage Assembly, uh, approved a Ti- --Title 16 on December 8th, 1987, and the ordinance became effective on January 1st, 1988. Uh, within the municipal code, I'll just, uh -- cover specific items, uh, which are the reporting requirements, since they're different from the state of Alaska, and the CRTK fees. The next slide shows our reporting requirements. So, they're lower than the state of Alaska. We have quantities of 4,500 pounds or more and compressed gas, uh -- hazardous class l- -- rating of three or four in quantities of 200 cubic feet or more, and then in the, uh, box white area shows the state of Alaska's, uh, amounts. And, uh -- since Anchorage being the most populous city in this state, uh -- we have that lower reporting threshold. that, uh -- was due to, uh -- in 1997, amendments to the state's statutes limited the municipality's power, uh, to require stricter regulations. These changes

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conflicted with the municipal code, so in 1998, the Municipality of Anchorage and Anchorage Fire Department requested an exemption, uh -- by providing justification for the lower threshold and was granted the exception in reportable quantities. Uh, the next slide are additional, uh, reporting requirements differing from the state, and, uh -- and that's, uh, hazardous waste in quantities of 220 pounds or more, acute hazardous waste in quantities of 2 point -- uh -- 2.2 pounds or more. And we do require, uh -- NFPA Placard Ver- -- Verification. They have to provide, uh, photos of the placard where they're located, uh -and that is required on our end every subsequent -- e--- even reporting year, and first time f- -- filers have to, uh -- when they have new chemicals, uh -must report the -- those when they are received. Uh -- the next slide shows our CRTK fees or, uh -- about our CRTK fees, uh -- so, they were immediately included when, uh, Municipal Code 16.110 was enacted in 1987. And the most recent CRTK fees updates, uh -were approved in 2018 and applied in 2019. Fees are based on reportable quantities, uh -- they have increased throughout the years, but we don't have a set schedule as far as, uh -- when they should be, uh -- increased. Except to the fire marshal to review

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the fee -- the fee structure in a few years. Uh -so, the next slide shows our quantity -- our reportable quantities and the amounts. The next slide is, uh -- we have a -- uh -- a sheet on our webpage that shows all of our reportable quantities and the fee structure, and I'll provide our webpage so you can take a look at it, uh -- a little further. Uh, the next slide is just, uh -- what -- what our, uh, billing process, uh -- how I go through our billing process, uh -- you know, looking over our E-Plan, uh, reports, calculating the quantities, and, uh -comparing the prior year fees for changes in reporting. Uh -- it is then invoiced through our third party billing company. We confirm payment of -once payment of invoice has been received, a certificate of compliance is, uh -- sent to the customer. Uh -- so, uh -- this past reporting year was my first time processing CRTK, so it was quite a -- quite a learning process for me, uh -- so -- and my CRTK season goes beyond the March 1st deadline, because I have to go through every -- every single one of those reports that come in and -- and I do check the E-Plan database monthly for any new -- new reports or first time filers. We administer, uh, approximately -- approximately 460 CRTK reporting, uh

| | CRTK reporting facilities each year. And, uh, the |

And, uh -- what I will do is I will move 20 forward with sharing, uh -- I'll start moving forward 2.1 with sharing the slides for Kathy's presentation now. 22 That sounds good. Let's go ahead and proceed with Hoage: 23 that. 24 Shay: Cool. Thanks, Roy. Uh, good morning, everybody. 25 am Kathy Shay of the Alaska Department of

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Environmental Conservation. I am the Tier 2, uh, Emergency Planning and Community Right to Know Coordinator here. I think I know everybody on the call, uh -- could I have the next slide, uh -- please, Roy? Uh -- you know, rec- -- in past meetings, we've had some concerns from many of you on how to fulfill some of the requirements of, uh -- LEPCs. I know there are some challenges with resources and things, uh -- and so, we wanted to find some solution that might -- might help, uh, with some of it, uh -- and so, could I have the next slide, please? Uh, and so, just before I start, uh, with this new tool -- just a quick reminder. Everybody knows this already but some of the LEPC responsibilities are, you know -- we're supposed to develop a -- a Hazmat Emergency Response Plan, which from on I'm just going to call plan or I'll stumble over my words this whole time. Uh, so, we're supposed to review it annually, uh -- we're supposed to send it to the SERC for review, and we're supposed to exercise the plan, uh, and have the resources to -- to do so. Uh, the other thing that EPC- -- EPCRA gives us is -- or gives LEPCs is the authority to request information from facilities in their jurisdiction that have extremely hazardous chemicals, uh -- at their -- at their loc- -- at their

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facility and we can require them to participate in the planning process. Uh -- and they're al- -- they also, through their Tier 2 reports, they provide the name of their facility emergency response coordinator, and sit on the LEPC. Uh, next slide, please? And so, I'm not going to read these next two slides, but these are the mandatory minimum requirements that are supposed to be in the plan. Uh -- next slide, please? And then again, the next slide, please. So, that's just a reminder of what those requirements are. And so, we created a new tool to kind of help -- help you figure out, uh -- where to find some of this information, to reduce some of the burden on the planning efforts, and what I've found as we've been working on this -- I --I've looked at a lot of your websites and a lot of the emergency plans that you already have, and a lot of this information you've already done, uh -- so, I think that, uh -- you know, if this checklist may be -- is used as an appendix to your existing plan or -as -- you could keep it separate too, but it will show you -- it -- it kind of walks you through where you can find the information. Uh -- and the next slide, please, Roy? Uh -- is a closer look at that previous slide which you couldn't actually read, uh -- and so what we've done is in the blue sections on this page,

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we have each of those nine mandatory requirements, and then below that, the ABCs tell you where you can find that information. And so, for example, the first one is you know -- you're required to identify which facilities have emergency -- or have extremely hazardous substances in your -- your area, and so you already have that list available to you in E-Plan so you don't have to actually, you know, go around and find it anywhere else. If you sign into E-Plan, uh, and you filter your reporting facilities, uh -- by extremely hazardous substance, you get that list right away, and then you can look at that and find the facility coordinator and, uh -- what -- what chemicals they have, uh -- and how much and all that kind of stuff to help with your emergency planning. Uh -there's also you know -- in some of the -- the -- so the total -- the checklist is three pages total for each -- to, uh -- to follow the nine mandatory requirements. Uh -- and so, a lot of them reference, you know -- in the ABCs section they'll reference the, uh -- the Alaska Regional Plan, and the Area Contingency Plans for some of the response resources that we have, and I'm really sorry if you can hear the giant plane going overhead. Uh, you know, and so -so, like I said it refers to a lot of places where you

can find the information that already exists to help 1 2 alleviate some of the burden that you might be facing 3 as you're doing your emergency planning. And we don't intend for this checklist to be of- -- uh --4 5 mandatory. It's optional, and I'm sure it's not 6 perfect, so I really look forward to your comments on 7 its usability, uh -- so that we can make it better as we move forward. Uh, next slide, please? Yeah. 8 9 that's all I got unless you have any questions for me. 10 Thanks, Kathy. So, I'll open it up to questions here Hoage: 11 in just a second. Before I do that, Roy, can we, uh, 12 plan to send these slides out to the members? I know 13 we have some people that weren't able to get on. I do 14 have Dave Miller and Craiq Warren out of Sitka on my 15 desk phone. They're on speaker, listening in because 16 they could not connect to that number. So, they -- they are very interested, and they're willing to look at that, uh -- and I think that's pretty positive that we have, you know, the -the co-chairs of the commission -- our two commissioners -- uh -- willing to carry the water forward and -- and, uh -- make requests, even -- even -- even with the fiscal situation that the state's in, so -- so, yeah, Michael, we're definitely, uh -- we'll want to weigh in and it's just -- uh -- both us and DEC as far to, uh -- uh -- work on the -- the recommendations and the findings and the documents to

make sure that, uh -- they're supportable and -- and 1 2 we make it clear for -- for the commission so they can 3 take some action to try to continue supporting 4 everybody. Mattice: Oh, I just wanted to say a huge special thanks to you guys for all you've done over the years. I remember the day that I started in emergency management and felt like the new kid and you guys are slowly making

me feel like the old guy on the block but, uh -- I 1 2 can't thank you guys enough for everything you've 3 done, uh -- you know, it's just amazing to see that the LEPCs are not always focused on the goals of the 4 5 LEPC, but we have 30 plus members that, uh -- 30 plus people in attendance at our last LEPC meeting and --6 7 and we're always getting good things done, and so the work of this group is so critical and -- and the focus 8 9 that you guys provide is -- is extra important, so I 10 just wanted to say a huge special thanks to everybody 11 for all you do. We're going to be reaching out to 12 some regional players here in Southeast Alaska and talking about doing another disaster drill -- another 13 14 regional disaster drill here in a cou- -- in a couple 15 years here. We've got some training and exercise 16 money over the next couple years. We'll be inviting 17 some folks in for it, and, uh, we hope to be able to play with all of you again, uh -- and thanks for all 18 19 you're doing throughout the COVID response, and -- and 20 just thanks for being supportive of, uh, emergency 2.1 management in Alaska.

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Torres: Well, good morning, everyone. Thank you for all being here. I am super excited to see everybody. It's been a long time. We missed you at the last conference in

A lot of people have left their positions, so, uh -- we've had a long, what -almost year and a half now with COVID, so getting back to the basics, if you have something you'd like to share, uh, at the conference, please send me an email as soon as you can, because I'm putting the agenda -agenda together as we are, uh -- moving forward right Other thing I wanted to mention is if any of the now. communities are interested in SERC, please reach out Our SERC teams in Alaska have done amazing things over COVID. They have been so instrumental in helping communities with, uh, COVID testing sites, and with vaccine clinics, so if you have a team of people that would like to volunteer, that -- just reach out We have some great opportunities to do things to me. So, uh -- and then I also put in there virtually now. we have a great new campaign called Good Better Best. That's another opportunity to get your people in your community prepared, and it's a stepped approach starting with three days, moving up to seven, and up

to two weeks. We have come to realize that many people, uh, don't take those necessary steps when you tell them that they need two weeks or seven days, and this pandemic has not helped -- it -- people have been out of work. And so we're really looking at a stepped approach so that people feel that there's things that they can do that don't cost them money to start that journey. So, reach out to me. My team and I are super excited to work with people, uh -- we're doing things virtually. We're just not doing in person right now, but we have been extremely busy and we are anxious to share all of the things that we've done over this pandemic with you guys to help you guys get better prepared in your communities. Hoage: Thanks, Michelle. So, my -- my screen is showing me there's plus one more and I know I haven't gone to Tom Vaden yet or to Roy, but other than those two, is there anyone else on the call that I -- I somehow missed as I went through the list of participants?
